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Summary: Katie disobeys a family rule in going to the pond without adult supervision, not realizing that grownups' rules are like God's rules in that they represent love and protection. Includes discussion questions at the end of the story.

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DEAR PARENTS.

You and I have one of the most important responsibilities a person could ever have—caring for and raising a child. We know there are many temptations and pressures a child will face on his or her road to maturity. And we know rules are a big part of a child's life.


Katie's Adventure at Blueberry Pond, along with the discussion guide at the end of the story, will help you reinforce a powerful truth: Rules (particularly rules from God and godly parents) are given to provide for and protect you.

Josh and I have learned that when rules are enforced within the context of a loving relationship it generally produces a positive response in our children. In the story, Katie and her parents model this kind of relationship. As our children understand that boundaries are given for their good, our loving relationship with them is reinforced. And ultimately, we want them to come to know that God also says "no" because He wants to protect them and provide for them.

As you instill this basic principle about God and His rules in your child, you'll see it pay off as your child reaches his or her teens. The "WHY WAIT?" campaign is to help prepare teenagers to say no to premarital sex. And we find that those who have understood the motivation behind God's moral restrictions early in life and have a good relationship with their parents are more likely to obey His moral commands in their teen years.








As soon as they moved in, Katie's mom and dad talked to Katie and her brothers about the pond.


Dad said, "It's great to have a pond near our house. But nobody is to go to the pond without a grown-up because it can be dangerous there. We love you very much and want to protect you."

Katie and her brothers nodded. Katie asked, "Will you take us to the pond sometimes?"
















"But I asked God to forgive me—and you, too. I promise I won't go to the pond again. Ever! Even if no one likes me."


"We forgive you, Katie," Mom said gently. "But you must understand how serious a wrong you committed. You could have been hurt, and you must learn from this."


"Are you going to punish me?" Katie asked.

"I want you to come with me to the pond," Dad said as he held out his hand.












He looked into Katie's eyes and spoke more seriously than Katie had ever heard him speak before.




























- Why wasn't Katie supposed to go to the pond without a grown-up?
